



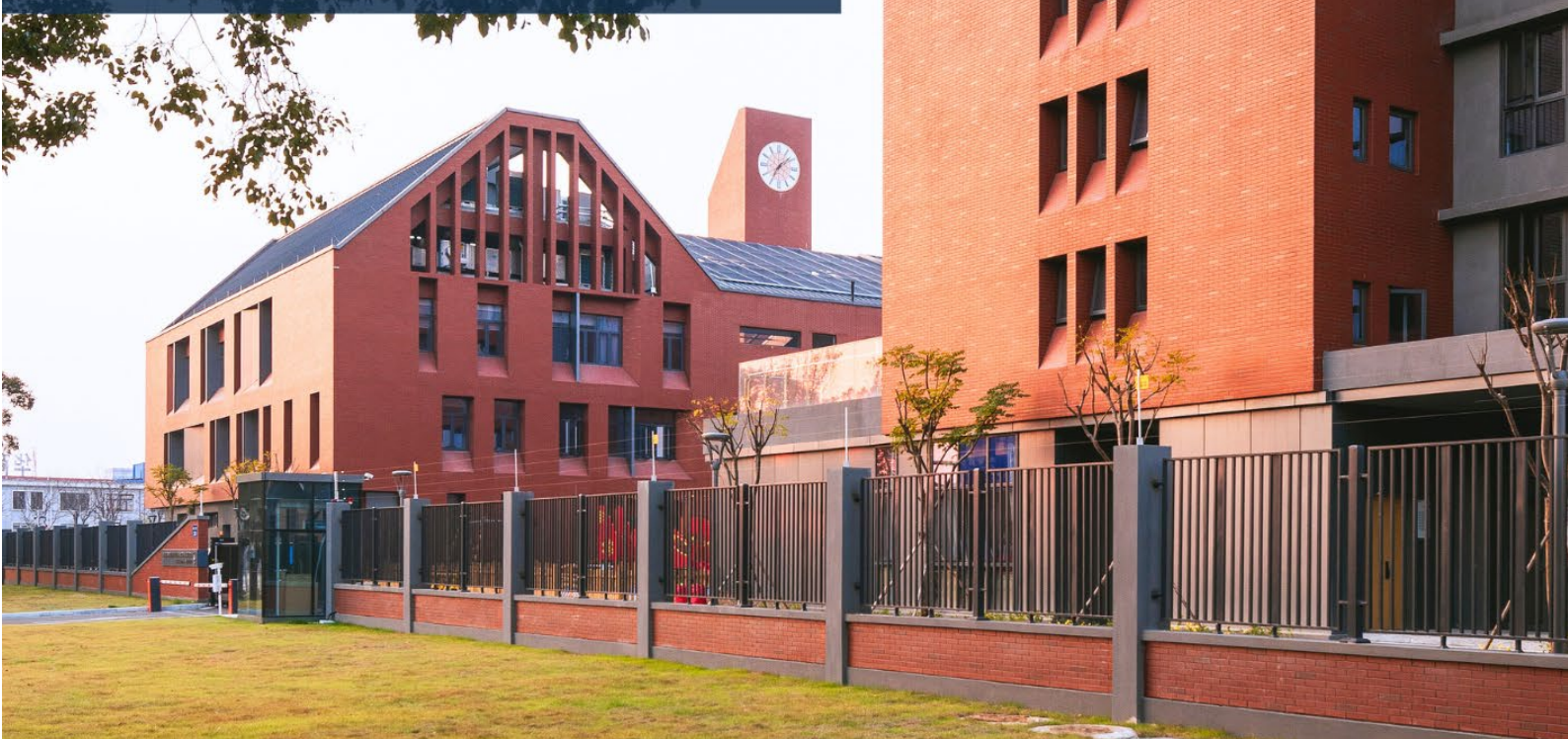

Preventing Drowning Notice to Parents

Please educate your children to adhere to the **"Six Don'ts"**:

- Don't swim alone.
- Don't swim without permission or supervision from parents or teachers.
- Don't swim in areas without safety facilities or rescue personnel.
- Don't swim in unfamiliar waters.
- Don't swim in dangerous or unregulated waters.
- Students who cannot swim should not attempt to rescue others on their own.

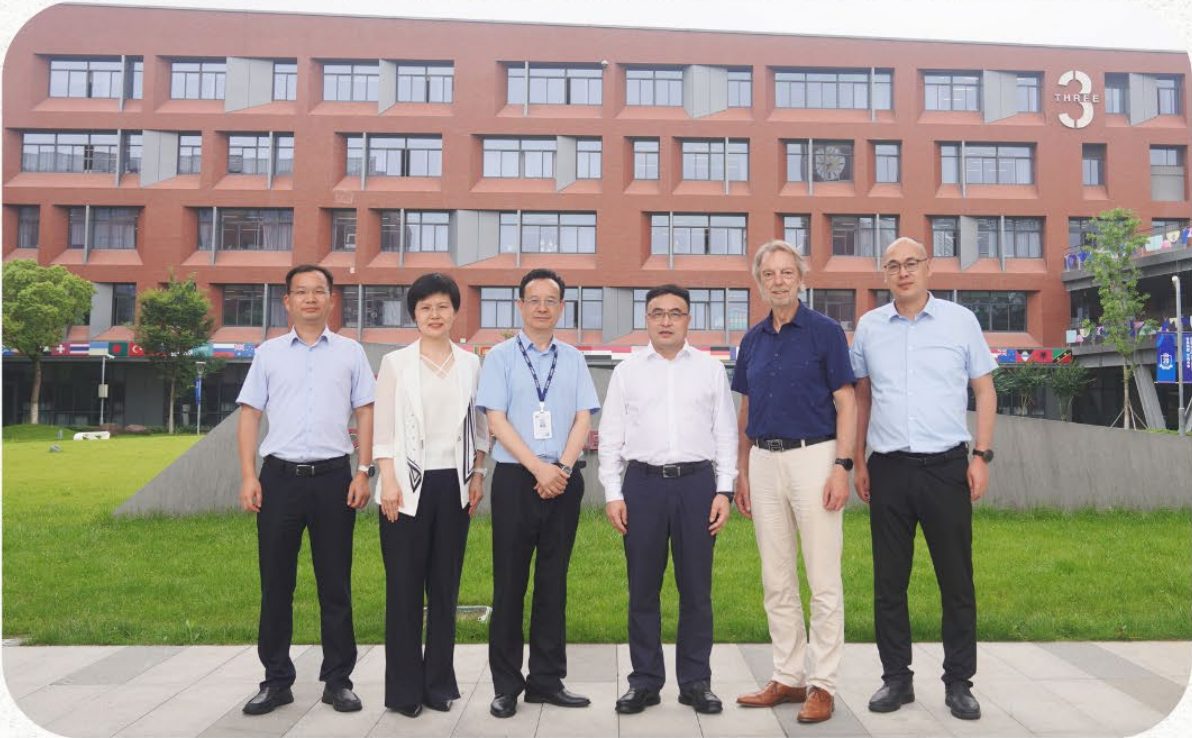
Especially remind your children: if they see someone drowning, they should not attempt a rescue themselves but instead call for help immediately by dialling 110 or 120.

Parents are expected to follow the **"Four Knows"** regarding their children's whereabouts:

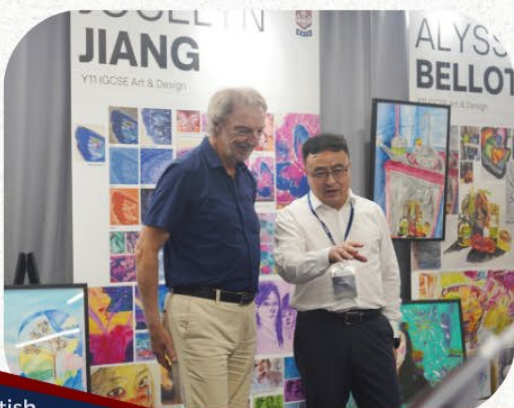
- Know where your child is going;
- Know what your child is doing;
- Know who your child is with;
- Know when your child is expected to return.

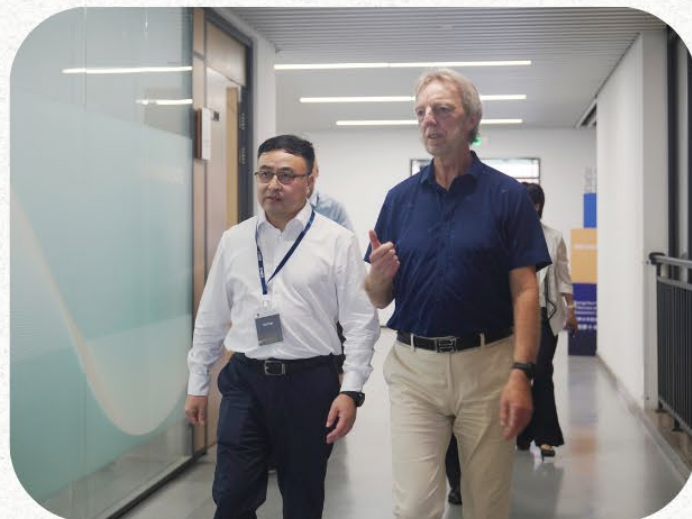
During after-school hours, weekends, and holidays, parents must pay extra attention to their children's activities and whereabouts to prevent drowning incidents caused by lack of supervision.

Paralympic Champions Bring Goalball to NBIS

On June 11, the sports hall at Ningbo British International School (NBIS) echoed with the sounds of practice, applause, and cheers as an interactive goalball event was in full swing. The school was honoured to invite three special guests: Bao Daolei, gold medalist in goalball at the 2008 Beijing Paralympics; Zhang Wei, silver medalist at the 2016 Rio Paralympics; and Zhang Zhiyu, a player from the Beijing goalball team. They introduced students to the unique experience of playing this Paralympic sport.



Goalball is a ball sport specifically designed for individuals with visual impairments. It originated in Austria in 1946 and is now an official event in the Paralympic Games. The game uses a rubber ball that weighs 1,250 grams and contains bells inside, allowing players to track it by sound. All participants wear blackout masks, relying entirely on the sound of the bells to determine the direction and speed of the ball.



"Hold the ball, step forward, bend your knees, and throw!" Under the instruction of champion coach Bao Daolei, students carefully mimicked every motion of gripping, throwing, and defending during the pre-match training.



As the match officially began, students donned their eye masks and cautiously navigated the court in total darkness, throwing and defending the ball. On the field, they paused to listen attentively, moved tentatively, and responded with heightened awareness. In the dark, every throw and defensive move required immense courage and sensory perception.

"At first, it was a bit scary because once you put on the eye mask, you can't see anything, and you worry the ball might hit you," said Evan, a 10th-grade student. "But gradually, I realised my ears became more sensitive—every sound became extremely important."

Rom, an 8th-grade student, shared his excitement after the experience: "The moment I put on the eye mask, the world turned completely dark. I had to listen with my ears and feel with my heart. What seems like a simple sport to us actually requires endless repetition and effort for visually impaired athletes to confidently stand on the field."





Later that day, Bao Daolei, Zhang Wei, and Zhang Zhiyu also hosted a Q&A and career-sharing session with all high school students. In an interview, Bao Daolei remarked that goalball is more than just a competitive sport—it's a powerful way to respect life and challenge prejudice. By allowing students to experience the sport firsthand, it helps them develop a deeper and more concrete understanding and empathy for people with disabilities.

Aaron Lowe, the Head of Secondary, stated that organising a goalball game for students is a reflection of the school's inclusive education philosophy. "We are committed to creating a supportive, inclusive, and effective learning environment where every student can fully participate and develop holistically. Through this unique sports activity, students not only gain a deeper understanding of and empathy for people with disabilities, but also learn how to treat every individual with equality and kindness."

This week, we were diving into the fascinating world of **Sea Creatures!** Children discovered the wonders of ocean life through fun, hands-on activities that sparked curiosity and creativity. Through play, they developed early science knowledge, fine motor skills, numeracy, and teamwork - all while exploring textures, colors and marine habitats.

Plastic Bag Jellyfish Art Painting

The children created colorful jellyfish using plastic bags, paint and googly eyes. They squeezed and blended colours outside the bag, then added tentacles with yarn.

EYFS Links:

- Expressive Arts & Design - Exploring colours and textures.
- Physical Development - Strengthening finger muscles while squeezing and pressing the bag.
- Understanding the World - Learning about jellyfish and their movements.



Feed the Shark Dice Game

A fun counting game where children rolled a die and "fed" the shark (a cardboard cutout with an open mouth) then matching number of fish.

EYFS Links:

- Mathematics - Counting, number recognition and subitising.
- Personal, Social & Emotional Development - Taking turns and sharing.
- Communication & Language - Using number vocabulary ('I rolled a 4!').



Pipe Cleaner Fishing Game

Using wooden fishing rods, children 'caught' pipe cleaner sea creatures (bent into fish, octopuses, etc.) from a sensory bin filled with colourful water beads.

EYFS Links:

- Physical Development - Hand-eye coordination and fine motor control.
- Literacy - Naming sea creatures and describing their features.
- Problem-Solving - Figuring out how to attract and pick up different shapes.



These activities made learning about sea creatures engaging and interactive, while supporting key developmental areas.

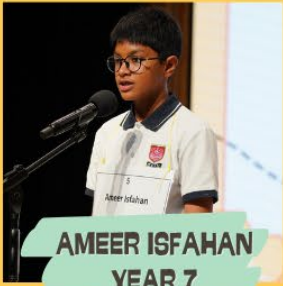
What is a Spelling Bee?

A Spelling Bee is a competition in which contestants are asked to spell a broad selection of words, usually with varying difficulty.

Its purpose was to help students improve their spelling, increase their vocabulary, learn concepts and develop correct English usage to help them throughout their lives. The audience also followed along and likely learned to spell some complicated words.

The Spellers

The students took part in class spelling tests to prove themselves before competing. Each competitor was given a spelling booklet with hundreds of words to learn. However, none of the competitors knew which words would appear during the competition. There were two to five competitors from each year group from Years 7-9. A total of 15 students competed.



The Competition

The competition was fierce as students were well-prepared, focused and determined to prove their spelling proficiency. The level of confidence demonstrated by the competitors as they asked judges for the meanings of the words and alternate pronunciations was certainly impressive.

The Judges

This year, the judge was Mr Paul Du. Mr Ivan Muhov manned the PPT, and Mr Chris Black gave students the meaning of words. Mr Sean Armstrong fielded the alternate pronunciation and audience prizes. The MC was Head of English, Ms. Alicia Froome.

The audience avidly supported the competitors, cheering them on each round. They were particularly excited for the 'audience round' questions as prizes would be won!



Each round of the competition became increasingly intense as competitors were eliminated after exhausting their chances.
